PSALM 1 | THE WAY OF THE RIGHTEOUS + THE WICKED

¹ Blessed is the man

who walks not in the counsel of the wicked,

nor stands in the way of sinners,

nor sits in the seat of scoffers;

² but his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night.

³ He is like a tree

planted by streams of water

that yields its fruit in its season,

and its leaf does not wither.

In all that he does, he prospers.

⁴ The wicked are not so, but are like chaff that the wind drives away.

⁵ Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous;

WEEK TWO

PSALM 90 | FROM EVERLASTING TO EVERLASTING A PRAYER OF MOSES, THE MAN OF GOD.

- ¹ Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations.
- ² Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever you had formed the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God.
- ³ You return man to dust and say, "Return, O children of man!"
- ⁴ For a thousand years in your sight are but as yesterday when it is past, or as a watch in the night.
- ⁵You sweep them away as with a flood; they are like a dream, like grass that is renewed in the morning:
- ⁶ in the morning it flourishes and is renewed; in the evening it fades and withers.
- ⁷ For we are brought to an end by your anger; by your wrath we are dismayed.

- 8 You have set our iniquities before you, our secret sins in the light of your presence.
- ⁹ For all our days pass away under your wrath; we bring our years to an end like a sigh.
- The years of our life are seventy, or even by reason of strength eighty; yet their span is but toil and trouble; they are soon gone, and we fly away.
- Who considers the power of your anger, and your wrath according to the fear of you?
- ¹² So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom.
- ¹³ Return, O Lord! How long?
 Have pity on your servants!
- ¹⁴ Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love, that we may rejoice and be glad all our days.
- ¹⁵ Make us glad for as many days as you have afflicted us, and for as many years as we have seen evil.
- ¹⁶Let your work be shown to your servants, and your glorious power to their children.

¹⁷ Let the favor of the Lord our God be upon us, and establish the work of our hands upon us; yes, establish the work of our hands! but the way of the wicked will perish

WEEK THREE

PSALM 91 | MY REFUGE AND MY FORTRESS

- ¹ He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High will abide in the shadow of the Almighty.
- ² I will say to the Lord, "My refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust."
- ³ For he will deliver you from the snare of the fowler and from the deadly pestilence.
- ⁴ He will cover you with his pinions, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness is a shield and buckler.
- ⁵ You will not fear the terror of the night, nor the arrow that flies by day,
- ⁶ nor the pestilence that stalks in darkness, nor the destruction that wastes at noonday.
- ⁷ A thousand may fall at your side, ten thousand at your right hand, but it will not come near you.

- ⁸ You will only look with your eyes and see the recompense of the wicked.
- ⁹ Because you have made the Lord your dwelling place the Most High, who is my refuge—
- ¹⁰ no evil shall be allowed to befall you, no plague come near your tent.
- ¹¹ For he will command his angels concerning you to guard you in all your ways.
- ¹²On their hands they will bear you up, lest you strike your foot against a stone.
- ¹³ You will tread on the lion and the adder; the young lion and the serpent you will trample underfoot.
- 14 "Because he holds fast to me in love, I will deliver him;I will protect him, because he knows my name.
- When he calls to me, I will answer him;I will be with him in trouble;I will rescue him and honor him.
- ¹⁶With long life I will satisfy him and show him my salvation."

PSALM 139 | SEARCH ME, O GOD, + KNOW MY HEART TO THE CHOIRMASTER. A PSALM OF DAVID.

- ¹O Lord, you have searched me and known me!
- ² You know when I sit down and when I rise up; you discern my thoughts from afar.
- ³ You search out my path and my lying down and are acquainted with all my ways.
- ⁴ Even before a word is on my tongue, behold, O Lord, you know it altogether.
- ⁵ You hem me in, behind and before, and lay your hand upon me.
- ⁶ Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is high; I cannot attain it.
- ⁷ Where shall I go from your Spirit?

 Or where shall I flee from your presence?
- 8 If I ascend to heaven, you are there!

 If I make my bed in Sheol, you are there!

- ⁹ If I take the wings of the morning and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea,
- ¹⁰ even there your hand shall lead me, and your right hand shall hold me.
- ¹¹ If I say, "Surely the darkness shall cover me, and the light about me be night,"
- ¹² even the darkness is not dark to you; the night is bright as the day, for darkness is as light with you.
- ¹³ For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb.
- $^{14}\,\text{I}$ praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made.
- Wonderful are your works;

 my soul knows it very well.

STUDY TIPS

- 1. Ask the Holy Spirit to be your teacher and your guide as you study.
- 2. Read the psalm slowly. Stop and think about it.
- 3. Read the psalm out loud.
- 4. Read the psalm more than once, and in different translations.
- 5. Read the psalm as an expression of your own soul.
- 6. Read the psalm as a prayer or praise to God. Allow it to lead you to worship.
- 7. Pay attention to the imagery used to express emotions and spiritual truths.
- 8. Look for ways to apply the truths about God's character and His ways to your life.
